111 and hospital visits

1. If you feel the need to phone 111, depending on the time of day, allow up to 45 minutes for them to answer.
2. If they send you to hospital you need to be there within an hour of them speaking to you and will give you a time. This doesn't mean you have an appointment you MAY have to wait like everyone else..
3. At Scarborough Hospital check in at reception. I don't think that the 111 service is linked to Scarborough because on two occasions I wasn't on the list. Receptionist said "I will add you to the list".

4. When you take your place in the waiting area, memorise all the people who are there already. Make a mental note of anyone arriving after you.
5. When someone who arrived after you has been called, immediately go to reception and ask whether you are still on the list, when the receptionist continues to stare at the screen for at least 5 minutes and then disappears to talk to someone, it means you still haven't hit the list. They will tell you they have transferred you to another list, so all that memorising goes by the board because you have to start all over again. I have sent an email to York Hospitals to ask them to check the 111 link.

Wildlife

Guy and Jane report:

Wounded Guillemot on the lawn outside Brigg Court

This week a hare sat on the road in front of No. 19 then hopped off towards the camp site.

Many dolphins seen in Filey Bay, there may have been a whale but it could be a very large dolphin.

A man told Guy that because of shellfish being illegally taken from the bay the Guillemots are starving.

There is a sign up at the Country Park warning against illegal fishing in both English & Chinese. If you go on the beach, you rarely see small crabs now, not sure if it's the time of year or a result of over fishing, such a shame.

20 October Whimbrel – very rare in these parts and probably just passing through. Similar to Curlew but Guy knows his birds.

19 October a small deer on the Brigg and 10 Oyster Catchers

A number of people suspected of gathering shellfish illegally have been stopped during an operation along a stretch of the Yorkshire coast.

Investigators from the Gangmasters and Labour Abuse Authority (GLAA) carried out a four-day investigation in Filey and Redcar earlier this month. They were looking for unsafe working practices and potential gangmaster offences, the GLAA said.

Several people were spoken to and one interviewed under caution, it added.

The investigators were checking for people controlling workers without a GLAA licence on a coast with unpredictable tides, hazardous rock pools and exposed cliffs, it said.

Farewell to a true gentleman

It is with great sadness that we said goodbye to Ernie Padfield, who with his wife Ruth was one of the first residents of the bungalows.

Ernie, aged 88, was taken to Scarborough Hospital after a fall and passed away on September 27th. Although we knew Ernie for only a few months, we all warmed to his ready smile and caring nature.

Ernie and Ruth had been married for more than 66 years. They were teenage sweethearts who met at the Gospel Hall in Bristol. They married at the same hall on Ernie's 22nd birthday, after he had completed his National Service.

They have three children, Julie, Philip and Stephen, seven grandchildren and five great grandchildren. The family was central to Ernie's life, alongside his strong Christian faith, which supported him to the end, when he told Ruth he was “going to Glory”.

Ernie worked as a chemist at Bristol University before deciding on a career change at the age of 30. He trained to become a teacher and taught building science at colleges in Bristol, Salisbury and Bath, where he was popular with both students and colleagues.

He was a keen DIY enthusiast and gardener. That comes as no surprise to those of us who saw him working tirelessly getting the bungalow and garden just right. His tip of mixing egg shells, cardboard and banana skins into the clay soil to soften it was a masterstroke. However, Ruth was rather dubious when he decided that, instead of buying a new table, he would saw the old one in half to make it smaller. He did, and it worked a treat! As one of his sons said: “If Dad's got a penknife he can do anything”.

After he retired, Ernie and Ruth moved to Haxby, York, to be near their son Stephen. Nine years later they moved to Pembroke, where their daughter Julie lived. Earlier this year, they made the move back to Yorkshire, to 21 Chantry Gardens. Ernie spent many hours in the garden and his beloved shed, resisting Ruth's entreaties to come in and sit down after tea.

He was also a bit of daredevil and once paraglided behind a speedboat in Cyprus. Ruth recalls it was rather windy but that didn't deter him.

He and Ruth were regular attenders of St Oswald's Church, Filey, and the vicar, the Rev Nigel Chapman, conducted his funeral service.

God bless Ernie, a true gentleman.
